

Claudia's nabs AAU berth

Claudia's tightened up its defense after falling behind, 10-4, early in the Oregon AAU Major Basketball Tournament championship game Sunday and went on to register a 106-101 victory over Lu's Freedom Stars at Mt. Scott.

"We weren't getting back on defense early in the game," said Claudia's Coach Walt Spitznagel. "They were running on us and getting the layin."

Lu's guard Amos Allen led the early charge, scoring three quick baskets.

But Claudia's took the lead for good when former Portland Trail Blazer Greg Smith hit a three-point play to make the score 56-53 with 18 seconds remaining in the half.

And Claudia's wasn't finished with the half.

Ray Willis scored following a Lu's turnover and Smith sank another shot following a steal to make the halftime score 60-53.

"We have bigger people than they do and we started getting the rebounds," said Spitznagel. "When we stay with our offense and get back on defense it takes a good team to beat us."

The Freedom Stars almost proved to be that "good team" as they rallied from an 11-point deficit midway through the final half, cutting Claudia's lead to three, 98-95, with four minutes remaining.

But free-throw shooting problems plagued Lu's at the end.

Henry Harris was high man for Claudia's with 24 points.

Claudia's, which last won the state title in 1970, advances to the Northwest Regional tournament next Saturday and Sunday at Seattle.



Vaughn Realty Whips Studs, Gains Revenge, AAU Berth

Vaughn Realty of Spokane turned the tables on the Cheney Studs of Tacoma Sunday afternoon and won the Northwest Regional AAU Basketball Tournament, played at Franklin High School.

Behind ex-Gonzaga stars Bill Suter and Gary Lechman, the Eastern Washington team fought back from a 46-41 half-time deficit to down the de-

in the finals of the Regionals.

"We've been aiming for them all year," revealed smiling player-coach Dick Hannan.

THROUGH the first half it looked as though the Studs were on their way to their third straight championship. With Dick Smith bucketing 19 of his 31 points in the first half, the Studs maintained a 10 point advantage most of the way.

The second half was all Vaughn Realty, though. With Suter triggering the attack out front and Lechman controlling things underneath the bucket, the Realtors grabbed the lead with six minutes gone in the half. Four minutes and four Suter buckets later the lead was up to 10 points.

Though the Studs closed the gap to one point with 4:06 to go, Vaughn Realty was able to hold the lead and salt the game away in the last two minutes with one-and-one free throws.

THE KEY to the Realtors' victory was team work and defense, ingredients often missing in AAU teams.

"The nucleus of this team has been here for five years

and we've gotten so we can play together pretty well," admitted Hannan.

Meeting each other for the 10th time this year, Claudia's and Dr. Bernard's played one of their typical games — run and gun.

BEEFED UP with guards Rick Whelan and Jim Woodland, Claudia's held the upper hand throughout the first half. With Woodland canning long jumpers with uncanny accuracy and Jim Boutin pumping in fielders from all angles, Claudia's built to a 48-33 lead at one time, before Bernard's closed to within nine at half.

Midway through the second half Bernard's made their bid. Within a six minute span Don Hakala pumped in 10 points and Steve Anstett 8 to move Bernard's into a one point lead, but the lead was short lived. Boutin tipped home a rebound seconds later to give Claudia's the lead for good.

For the tournament, Pauly was the leading scorer with 56 points.

Allen missed breaks that led Smith to NBA

His post man was a 7-foot-2 basketball artist named Jabbar.

He played in front of crowds of 10,000 or more. And the only banners hanging in the arenas were hung in honor of past world champions.

Now, Greg Smith, who helped Claudia's to the Oregon Amateur Athletic Union basketball championship by scoring 17 points Sunday in a 106-101 win over Lu's Higher Ground, is back to his basketball roots and talking about his good fortune.

Smith, who ended his playing career with the Portland Trail Blazers in 1975, was a starter for the Milwaukee Bucks who won the NBA title in 1971. Kareem Abdul-Jabaar played on that team.

"I was lucky, a lot of players who could be pro basketball players don't get the breaks I got," Smith said after Sunday's championship game.

"The ABA (American Basketball Association) was my big break. I came along during the second year of the ABA, and there was a demand for a lot of basketball players," Smith said. "My coach was Larry Costello, who I think is a very good coach. I just got the right breaks."

Ironically, Sunday's loser, Lu's Higher Ground, had an example of a talented player who didn't get the breaks.

Amos Allen, the tournament's most valuable player, scored 35 points in a losing cause. The lithe, smooth-playing 6-3 guard drew praise from Smith.

"There is a lot of talent here and some guys, if they had tried, might have made it in pro basketball," Smith said. "Allen is one of them. He's a fine shooter."

Allen, who graduated from Jefferson High School but did not play basketball there, said the National Basketball Association was never more than a dream to him.

His basketball talent has been displayed only in front of small crowds, mostly family and friends. His post men rarely are taller than 6-5, and the only banners in the arenas in which he plays admonish the participants to refrain from dunking the ball. "Violators will

be ejected from the building."

"I was always too small in high school, so I didn't have much confidence," Allen said. "I went to Seattle Central Community College for two years and played basketball and grew up and started getting my confidence."

"Now, I think I can play with the best of them," the 25-year-old continued. "I thought about trying out in a pro camp, but I didn't know how to go about it."

Largely on Allen's outside shooting, Lu's was able to maintain a lead for most of the first half.

Smith, however, scored six points in the final 49 seconds of the half, and Henry Harris added a bucket as Claudia's took a 60-53 lead.

Morris Griffin, who only scored four points in the first half, had nine points in the first 7½ minutes of the second half as Claudia's took an 82-71 lead with 12:33 to play.

Trailing 96-85 with 7:37 to play, Lu's made its final charge. John Boardman scored eight points, and Lu's added four free throws to slice the lead to 100-97 with 3:57 to play.

Spreading its offense, Claudia's went to a slowdown game and sprung Harris open for consecutive buckets to ease the pressure at 104-97.

The next action for the Amateur Athletic Union champs will be in Seattle in the regional tournament at a date to be announced.

Explaining Sunday's close game, Smith said, "We match up real well with each other. We've played four times this year and we won all four, but they were all close."

Smith played Sunday's game hobbled by a bad left leg which was tightly bandaged. A man who has experienced the glory of an NBA championship, Smith was asked why he continued to play.

"Because, I still care about the game a great deal," he said.

Stautz, who garnered only two points in the first half, dropped in a pair of jumpers and a couple of free throws to tie the score at 66-all, and Ed Corell, former Washington Husky, put his teammates in front for the first time since early in the game with an easy layin with 7:27 left to play.

Hunt dropped through a set shot to give Claudia's a 71-70 lead at 7:15, but another ex-Husky, Dale Easley, was accurate on a layin as he and his fellow players continually broke through to the bucket to take the lead for good.

Claudia's, playing with four fouls on four players, managed to stay within reach of victory until Corell canned an

other layin with 3:04 left to run the score to 82-78. From here the Seattle club stalled, forcing Claudia's to foul, and that was all she wrote.

Federal Old Line held a two-point margin at 6-4 in the first three minutes of action, but the Portlanders came on with a rally of their own and slowly built up the 51-38 halftime score.







It's 'Coach' Lumpkin now

It's a long way from playing in the NBA championship finals to student teaching at Lincoln High School in Portland, Ore.

But Phil Lumpkin has traveled that route — in fewer than 18 months.

And he apparently is making the transition with ease.

"Pro basketball's not the only way to survive in life," says the sharp, soft-spoken Lumpkin, whose brief, two-year pro basketball career began with the Portland Trail Blazers and ended after the next season in Phoenix, where he collected a second-place share of NBA playoff money with the Suns.

"You have to have options in life. And I think this offers me one of those alternatives."

"This" means student teaching PE at Lincoln, where he began his duties Tuesday.

It also means, says Jerry Carr, Lincoln's head basketball coach, that Lumpkin will be the Cardinals' No. 1 basketball assistant this winter.

"This is the first step, although I may never even coach," insists Lumpkin, a realist although he is noted for his positive nature.

"Listen," Carr insists, "Phil will assist me. I want him with me. And he'll do a good job."

Carr and Lumpkin first became acquainted when Carr ran Lenny Wilkens' camp in Issaquah, Wash., and Wilkens (then Trail Blazer coach) had drafted Lumpkin in the second round of the 1974 college draft.

"Phil rotates very well," said Carr, "and he's positive but soft . . . exactly what Lincoln needs."

What forced Lumpkin, a 6-1 guard out of Miami (Ohio), into "accepting one of my options" after only two years of pro basketball?

"To be brutally honest," he says slowly, "my knee injury did more to end my career than anything. Portland traded me to Phoenix and I tore some cartilage in my right knee two days after I got there."

"They finally operated on me around the first of November and I was back the 23rd of January. I didn't have adequate time to rehabilitate the knee, but playing with a team that goes all the way to the finals . . . to the sixth game (before Phoenix lost to Boston) was fun, really fun."

"Still, I didn't have time to continue rehabilitation during the short time off in the summer, and then I reinjured it . . .

"You know, look at Lloyd Neal. They (the Blazers) are letting him come back from his surgery slowly. But I didn't have that opportunity. Phoenix will not

tell you that my knee was the reason they waived me before the start of last season. But I feel they didn't want to take the chance of me reinjuring it."

Is he bitter?

"Bitter?" Lumpkin said, pausing. "No. Disappointed? Yes.

"It's just that it's tough to put it down all of a sudden because you enjoy the sport, and it hurts not to be able to participate in the game."

"At least I can say I happened to be part of history in Phoenix, and I was let go at the top . . ."

Lumpkin also is considering playing AAU basketball with Claudia's, "depending on my physical and mental state. I won't rush getting into playing shape, and I may play if it won't kill my body," he laughed.

"I'd have to be able to play at my own pace, because my knee will never again be 100 per cent. And then there's always the fact that if I hurt it again, I may never walk."

Discipline is a popular word in Lumpkin's vocabulary.

"You've got to have a factor of discipline," he says, "or you won't ever get any place."

And that, he feels, is what hurt the Blazers during his 1974-75 season in Portland.

"Except for two players, most were professionally serious about their jobs," says Lumpkin. He declined to name names, however.

In addition, Lumpkin feels, "We won 38 games, but if (Bill) Walton had played 30 games that season the way he played 66 last season, where would that have put us?"

"I'm not trying to rap the guy," Lumpkin insists, "because this is all pure speculation on my part."

Life is only beginning, it seems, for Phil Lumpkin, who will be 26 in December.

And the words "giving up" do not set well with him.

"Crying in your beer," he says, "is not the way to get it done."
