DAY 1 Casablanca, the first gateway to the kingdom Casablanca The adventure begins beside the Atlantic, where the Hassan II Mosque rises above the sea. After La Corniche, a welcome dinner opens the door to Moroccan flavors and the group experience.	DAY 2 Imperial Rabat and the road north Casablanca - Rabat - Tangier Elegant avenues and royal history lead us through Hassan Tower, the Mausoleum of Mohammed V and the Oudayas before continuing to Tangier.
DAY 3 Tangier, where two seas meet Tangier We explore the medina, Cape Spartel and the Caves of Hercules, then leave the afternoon free for the sea, shopping or a leisurely café.	DAY 4 Chefchaouen, the dream painted blue Tangier - Chefchaouen - Fez The Rif Mountains lead to blue alleys, intimate squares and artisan traditions before we continue to Fez.
DAY 5 Fez, a journey through the centuries Fez Fez opens onto Al Qarawiyyin, the Chouara tanneries, workshops and souks where centuries-old crafts still shape daily life.	DAY 6 From the Atlas to the golden silence of the Sahara Fez - Merzouga Via Ifrane, Azrou and the Ziz Valley, we reach Merzouga at sunset and continue by dromedary to DWO Golden Camp.
DAY 7 Sunrise among dunes and gorges Merzouga - Dades After sunrise, a 4x4 adventure, Khamlia and nomadic encounters lead us through Rissani and Todra Gorge to the Dades Valley.	DAY 8 The Route of a Thousand Kasbahs Dades - Marrakech Rose Valley, Skoura, Ouarzazate and Ait Ben Haddou shape the road across the High Atlas toward Marrakech.
DAY 9 Marrakech, the spell of the Red City Marrakech Koutoubia, Bahia Palace, Saadian Tombs, Ben Youssef and Jemaa el-Fna reveal the city through architecture, color and sound.	DAY 10 A day to choose your own story Marrakech Free time for souks, hammam, spa and gastronomy, plus an exclusive Moroccan cooking class with Rosita and a surprise farewell dinner.
DAY 11 Until next time, Morocco Marrakech - Casablanca We return by road to Casablanca for the flight home, carrying photographs, friendships and the feeling of having crossed a world of legends.	



CHAPTER I | THE ATLANTIC & THE STRAIT

Casablanca, Rabat & Tangier

The first days move from the modern Atlantic coast to an imperial capital and finally to the city where Africa looks toward Europe.

DAY 1 Casablanca, the first gateway to the kingdom

Casablanca | Hassan II Mosque | La Corniche

Casablanca combines the energy of a major city with Arab-Muslim heritage and 20th-century architecture. Its defining landmark is the Hassan II Mosque, built beside the ocean as a work of light, marble, carved wood and zellige.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- Hassan II Mosque: one of Morocco's major religious and architectural landmarks, rising directly on the Atlantic shore.
- La Corniche: a waterfront promenade showing Casablanca's more contemporary face.
- Welcome dinner: our first encounter with Moroccan hospitality and flavors.

THE MOMENT: Raise a glass by the waterfront as the group begins to take shape.

DAY 2 Rabat, a capital between two eras

Casablanca - Rabat - Tangier

Rabat blends Arab-Muslim heritage with modern urban planning. Its gates, walls and monuments sit naturally beside elegant boulevards, gardens and the institutional life of the kingdom.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- Hassan Tower: remains of an ambitious Almohad project begun in the 12th century.
- Mausoleum of Mohammed V: a monument of great symbolic value and refined Moroccan decoration.
- Kasbah of the Oudayas: historic fortress, intimate lanes, gardens and views toward the Bouregreg.

THE MOMENT: See centuries of history coexist with the calm rhythm of a luminous capital.

DAY 3 Tangier, where two seas meet

Medina | Cape Spartel | Caves of Hercules | Free afternoon

Tangier has long been a city of passage, encounter and inspiration. The Atlantic and Mediterranean approach one another here, while the medina reflects Moroccan, Andalusian and European influences.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- Medina and Kasbah: whitewashed houses, old doors, small squares and viewpoints over the Strait.
- Cape Spartel: an Atlantic headland and one of northern Morocco's signature landscapes.
- Caves of Hercules: natural cavities shaped by geology and legend.

THE MOMENT: Enjoy the afternoon without rushing — sea views, shopping or coffee on the horizon.

CHAPTER II | MEDINAS THAT FEEL LIKE DREAMS

Chefchaouen & Fez

From the serene blues of the Rif Mountains to one of the best-preserved historic cities of the Arab-Muslim world.

DAY 4 Chefchaouen, the dream painted blue

Tangier - Chefchaouen - Fez

Between the Rif Mountains appears a medina of blue façades, narrow stairways and corners seemingly made for photography. Beyond its beauty, Chefchaouen preserves artisan traditions in textiles, wood and ceramics.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- The medina: small, calm and ideal for walking, with intimate squares and houses in many shades of blue.
- Uta el-Hammam Square: social heart of the city, ringed by cafés and watched over by the kasbah.
- Rif craftsmanship: woven blankets, wool garments, basketry, leather and ceramics.
- The landscape: mountains embrace the town and create a very different atmosphere from the imperial capitals.

THE MOMENT: Walk without a map and discover how every turn feels like a page from a storybook.

DAY 5 Fez, a journey through the centuries

Fez el-Bali | Al Qarawiyyin | Chouara | Mellah | Royal Palace

Fez is not observed from a distance; it is lived by entering its medina. Its urban fabric preserves techniques, crafts and ways of life developed over more than ten centuries, with Andalusian, eastern and African influences.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- Fez el-Bali: historic medina of labyrinthine lanes, fountains, madrasas, ovens, workshops and markets.
- Al Qarawiyyin: mosque and center of learning, one of the city's great spiritual references.
- Chouara Tanneries: terraces overlooking the traditional leather-dyeing process.
- Mellah and Royal Palace: memory of the Jewish community and magnificent ceremonial gates.
- Gastronomy: Fez is known for refined cuisine, including pastilla, tadjines and almond pastries.

THE MOMENT: Follow the medina and feel that behind each doorway another courtyard, workshop or story may appear.



CHAPTER III | THE GREAT CROSSING

Day 6 | From the Atlas to the Sahara

A day of contrasts: mountain roofs, cedar forests, oases, caravan routes and, at the end, the golden silence of the dunes.

We leave Fez and cross the Middle Atlas, watching the landscape change step by step. The green of Ifrane and Azrou gives way to plateaus, gorges and palm groves until we reach Merzouga, gateway to Erg Chebbi.

FIRST SCENE

Ifrane & the Cedars of Azrou

At about 1,650 meters, Ifrane surprises with sloped roofs, gardens and an alpine atmosphere. The cedar forests of the Atlas are home to the Barbary macaque.

THE LANDSCAPE SHIFTS

Midelt & the Ziz Valley

The road descends through mountains and rock formations. Palm groves announce the desert and recall the historic role of oases along caravan routes.

THE GATEWAY TO THE SAHARA

Merzouga & Erg Chebbi

Merzouga is surrounded by sand, palm groves and desert tracks. From here we enter Erg Chebbi, an immense dune landscape whose colors change with the light.

OUR SPECIAL NIGHT

DWO Golden Camp

We arrive by dromedary as the sun lowers over the dunes. Dinner, Moroccan hospitality and a night beneath the Sahara sky await us.

What makes this day unforgettable

- Watching Morocco change climate, architecture and scenery in a single day.
- Crossing cedar forests and the oases accompanying the Ziz.
- Riding by dromedary as the dunes turn gold.
- Sharing an included dinner and sleeping at DWO Golden Camp beneath the stars.

THE MOMENT: the instant the noise disappears, the horizon becomes infinite and the Sahara feels as if it belongs only to our group.

CHAPTER IV | LAND OF THE KASBAHS

From the Sahara to the Dades Valley

Gnawa music, oases, stone gorges, adobe fortresses and villages preserving the memory of caravan Morocco.

DAY 7 Sunrise among dunes and gorges

Merzouga - Khamlia - Rissani - Tinghir - Todra - Dades

The day begins with sunrise over the Sahara. In 4x4 vehicles we explore the Merzouga area, Khamlia music and aspects of nomadic life before continuing through the Tafilalt to Todra Gorge and the Dades Valley.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- Khamlia: village associated with the Gnawa musical tradition, born from African and Moroccan roots.
- Rissani: historic Tafilalt city linked to markets and caravan routes.
- Todra Gorge: dramatic rock walls rising beside the Tinghir palm grove.
- Dades Valley: kasbahs, stone formations and villages following the river.

THE MOMENT: End the day over an included dinner amid the calm mineral colors of the Dades Valley.

DAY 8 The Route of a Thousand Kasbahs

Dades - Rose Valley - Skoura - Ouarzazate - Ait Ben Haddou - Marrakech

The road to Marrakech gathers some of Morocco's most cinematic scenery. We cross Rose Valley and Skoura, encounter adobe fortresses, visit Ait Ben Haddou and cross the High Atlas via Tizi n'Tichka.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- Rose Valley: aromatic cultivation and earth-toned villages.
- Skoura and Kasbah Amridil: historic palm grove where adobe architecture blends with the oasis.
- Ouarzazate: gateway to the deep south and a setting for international film productions.
- Ait Ben Haddou: walled earthen ksar and exceptional example of pre-Saharan architecture.

THE MOMENT: Cross the High Atlas and watch Marrakech appear after a day of landscapes that feel cinematic.



CHAPTER V | THE SPELL OF THE RED CITY

Marrakech & the final chapter

Palaces, courtyards, souks, aromas and a square that transforms every evening into a great open-air theater.

DAY 9 Marrakech, a living museum nearly a thousand years old

Koutoubia | Bahia Palace | Saadian Tombs | Ben Youssef | Jemaa el-Fna

Founded by the Almoravids in the 11th century, Marrakech was a political, economic and cultural center with influence stretching toward Andalusia. Its medina combines monuments, gardens, markets and urban life that continues to reinvent itself.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- Koutoubia: its 77-meter minaret is the city's great visual landmark.
- Bahia Palace: courtyards, gardens, painted wood and mosaics reveal the refinement of palatial residences.
- Saadian Tombs: royal mausoleums of delicate decoration.
- Ben Youssef Madrasa: former center of Quranic study with a richly ornamented courtyard.
- Jemaa el-Fna: storytellers, musicians, aromas and food stalls create a true open-air theater.

THE MOMENT: Watch Jemaa el-Fna change at dusk as the whole city seems to awaken at once.

DAY 10 A day to choose your own story

Free day | Shopping | Hammam | Gastronomy | Cooking class | Farewell dinner

After so many roads, Marrakech gives us time. Return to the souks, seek out craftsmanship, reserve a hammam or spa, and savor local cuisine. The day also features an exclusive Moroccan cooking class with Rosita, followed by our surprise farewell dinner.

PLACES & CONTEXT

- Flavors to discover: tajine marrakchia, couscous, tajines, pastilla, mint tea and almond sweets.
- Shopping with identity: lamps, spices, textiles, leather, ceramics, basketry and carved wood.
- Wellness: the hammam is part of a Moroccan tradition of care, rest and encounter.
- Signature experience: a private Moroccan cooking class with Rosita — one memorable culinary encounter, not a daily class.

THE MOMENT: Raise a glass to what we have shared and realize that the group now feels like companions in one great adventure.

DAY 11

Road transfer to Casablanca and airport connection. We return with photographs, friendships and the feeling of having crossed a world of legends.
