




PROFESSIONAL PHOTOGRAPHER

Take photos like a pro with these insider tips

To capture stunning moments on your next vacation, relax, have fun and think like a professional photographer. Travel photographer Nancy Lova, whose work has appeared in National Geographic, Condé Nast Traveler and Travel + Leisure, shares her tips for taking unforgettable photos — even on your mobile phone.





DON'T POSE

"I like to capture photos that are in the moment rather than asking people to smile and pose. I often step back, take out my camera or phone and get a shot of everyone eating or drinking or simply staring at a view. Such photos have a way of transporting people to that very moment as if they were right there again."



KEEP IT SIMPLE

"When taking photos on a phone, try to take the picture as if it was already cropped. Focus on a specific angle and avoid leaving too much blank, open space like big areas of the sky or grass. For example, when taking pictures of a beach, I would get one palm tree in the photo or one or two beach umbrellas, rather than everything on the beach. This makes the shot cleaner while still displaying the setting."



HAVE FUN

"Don't worry about getting the perfect shot and don't worry about people watching you — just have fun with the camera. There's no right or wrong way to take photos as everyone has different styles. Take photos of everything. The more you practice, the more it becomes second nature."

Alternatively, you can hop on a sightseeing cruise to view the fineworks while floating on the Potornac River.

Featuring hundreds of ticketed theatrical performances and a free outdoor music festival, this entertaining event is a mishmash of genres — from live music and live art to stand-up comedy, poetry competitions and literary readings. There's also a free kids' festival, with special children's theater performances alongside painting workshops, puppet parades and animal encounters.

Where to stay: Let Palmerae, a Histori Grand Vications Club is a family-friendly resort conveniently located a 20-minute drive to Downtown Orlando and is less than 5 miles from Universal Orlando: Resort and Sea World® Orlando. Within the resort, your little ones can glide down the water slide and play in the splash pad while you relax with a cocktail at the poolside bar.

When: May 5-May 7, 2023

Where: San Diego, California

Why go: Also known as the Anniversary of the Battle of Puebla, Cinco de Mayo is an annual celebration of Mexico's victory over the Second French Empire in 1862. The holiday is celebrated throughout the United States, especially in San Diego, which is home to Flesta Old Town Cinco de Mayo. Typically held throughout the weekend closest to the holiday, this year's event marks its 40th year of festivities. The lively flesta plays host to a slew of Mexican restaurants and street-food stalls, lanes of mini tiendu (shops) offering a variety of traditional artwork and textiles, as well as an exciting lineup of live music, mariachi bands and street performances.

Where to step: Located about a 30-minute drive from downtown San Diego, Martinus a Himm Grand Vacation. Chile is an oceanfront property that exudes a relaxed Mediterranean wibe. Unwind at any of the three outdoor pools or indulge in a pampering treatment at the spa next door.

World Famous Blue Crab Festival in Myrtle Beach



Held at the Little River waterfront near North Myrtle Beach, this jamboree is the perfect opportunity to drink in scenic views, jive to live music and, of course, dig into heaps of delicious Southern seafood.

Sint Maarten One Island, Five Ways

This compact island offers classic Caribbean magic with European flair

Easily accessible from both sides of the Atlantic, this unique island in the northwest Caribbean Sea offers visitors year-round tropical weather and a mix of adventures that stretch almost as long as its pristine, sandy shores. Sint Maarten is the name of the more populated Dutch side of this 34-square-mile (54-square-kilometer) island, which it shares with France (where it's called St. Martin). In a single afternoon you can visit both countries for the quintessential Caribbean experience. Think powdery, white-sand beaches, sparkling azure waters, jungle tours, lively nightlife, funky beach bars and upscale restaurants. Here's our pick of some of the best things to see and do during your stay on "The Friendly Island."

On the Water

It's hard to describe the spectrum of blue hues of these waters. Pro Tip: Make sure you get a window seat on your flight into Princess Juliana International Airport, which is surrounded by bays and lagoons. That way you can admire from above the gradual shifts of azure and turquoise in the water. Once you're on the island, you'll have plenty of opportunities to see the colors up close.

Charter companies offer a variety of sailing, snorkeling and sunset-cruise excursions. One of the best known is Captain Bob's Speedboat, Snorkeling and Beach Tour, operated by <u>Soualing Destinations</u>. The six-hour tour takes you to Tintamarre Island, Pinel Island and Creole Rock, where you can swim with turtles and see parrotfish, angelfish and porcupine fish.

Sint Maarten also has a world-class reef and wreck scuba-diving, with the chance to encounter moray eels and stingrays.

Adventures and Dive Safaris are two shops that have garnered a five-star rating from the Professional Association of Diving Instructors.

On the Beach

Whether you're in the mood for a private patch of sand, water sports or a comfy beach chair in easy reach of a creamy blender cocktail, you have your choice of some of the best beaches in the world — and there are 37 of them all around the island.

Mullet Bay is one of Sint Maarten's most beautiful beaches, with clear, warm turquoise waters and a mix of tourists and locals.

Located on the western side of the island near the French border, it offers chair and beach rentals and a couple of places to get food and drinks. Try Rosie's Snack Shack for barbecue ribs and chicken. It's a swimming beach free of jet skis but be prepared for a few waves, depending on the season.

Round the next cove to find Maho Beach, which isn't your typical beach escape. The sandy strip is so close to the island's airport that the planes fly directly over your head, giving many visitors a thrill — not to mention a unique photo op (and a chance to try our tips from a professional <u>travel photographer</u>). Known as "the most extreme beach in the world," it may not be the most relaxing scene but it's definitely one of the most memorable. Have a cocktail at the Driftwood Bar while you plane-spot.

On the French side, head to <u>Orient Bay Beach</u>. Here you'll find a more typical beach resort scene with plenty of bars and restaurants to keep you in rose mode all day. There's also a lively water-sports site. It's a lovely, long beach with something for everyone, including a plage naturiste (nudist beach) at the south end.

In the Jungle

Sint Maarten isn't all about the water. A visit to the island wouldn't be complete without a trip to the jungle — ideally hurtling through the trees on a zip line. Rainforest Adventures has several thrilling options at Rockland Estate, including a chairlift ride with stunning views and a new zip line called the Flying Dutchman. Billed as the "steepest zip line in the world," it sends visitors harnessed in a chair down a 1,050-foot (320-meter) drop. The park also recently opened the Emilio Wilson Museum, which tells the inspiring story of an islander whose ancestors were enslaved and eventually bought the property to promote and protect the history and culture of the island.

If you're looking for more zen, check out Loterie Farms nature reserve and sanctuary on the French side. It features hiking trails and a pool amid lush gardens with day beds and cabanas. <u>Loteria Farms</u> also offers zip line adventures for those needing more adrenaline.

In the Towns and Cities

Before Christopher Columbus sighted the island in 1493, it was inhabited by descendants of the Arawak Indians, who had arrived around the year 800 and called the island "Soualiga" or "Land of Salt" in reference to the area's salt ponds. Eventually it was colonized by the Dutch and French, who partitioned the island in 1648. Today the northern French part is an overseas collectivity of the French Republic, while the southern Dutch area is a constituent country of the Kingdom of the Netherlands.

The Dutch capital, Philipsburg, is a charming port with cobblestone streets and colorful, colonial-style buildings. It's also a routine stop for cruise ships, and its Front Street area caters to day-trippers with jewelry and duty-free spirits shops. Marigot, the French capital, is quieter, with an open-air market and outdoor cafés.

On the Culinary Trail

The island has a well-deserved reputation as a foodie haven, with fresh seafood, Continental classics or Caribbean fusion cuisine. Zee Best is a favorite bakery and breakfast and lunch spot near the Simpson Bay Marina, offering more than 20 savory and sweet crepes. Jax Stankhouse in Maho Beach serves up oysters, black-truffle pasta and tomahawk steaks. On the French side, more bakeries abound. Baguettes — the kind you'd find in a classic bakery in Paris — are easily sourced here. A loaf with some cheese and fruit makes for an ideal picnic on the beach. For dinner, visit the Grand Case area to explore the island's best restaurants. Historic Caraibes is an elegant, fine-dining establishment with lobster thermidor from its lobster tanks and escargots drenched in garlic butter.

After your meal, head to The Red Piano, a rocking piano bar located in Pelican Key, or Lotus Nightchub, a dance club decorated in the style of a Buddhist temple near Simpson Bay.

Discover Florida's wilderness, from the Evendades to Biscove Bay

In Florida — a state that always feels wild at heart — interacting with nature is something that can happen at any turn and at any time.

Whether you're looking for a guided ecotour or prefer to chart your own course to explore South Florida's spectacular natural wonders, we've got a few ideas for where to go.



Visit Manatee Lagoon

Spotting a threatened West Indian manatee in the wild is a highlight for Florida visitors — but you need to be in the know to find the somewhat reclusive animals. When you visit the free Manates Lagrace attraction in West Palm Beach, you can observe the gentle giants from the center's observation deck. The warm-blooded mammals are drawn here by warm-water outflows from the nearby Florida Power & Light Company plant, which spill into Lake Worth Lagoon. It's not uncommon to spot mothers and babies surfacing together in tender moments. And when the weather turns cold, the manatees can arrive by the hundreds. The best time to spot these gentle creatures is during the winter months, when water temperatures in the Gulf of Mexico and Atlantic Ocean plunge. Inside, you'll find year-round exhibits about manatees, lionfish and other lagoon life that shed light on this critical Florida ecosystem.

Take a biking tour around Miami Beach

Pedaling a bike is a low-carbon way to experience Miami Beach and take in the fresh ocean breeze. Slap on some sunscreen and head to the humi Brach Bicycle Contar to take your pick from electric cycles, beach cruisers, hybrids and fat-tire sand bikes. Then, set off on a self-guided tour to explore the sun-kissed surroundings. One of the most pleasant places to cycle is the Miami Beachwalk, a 7-mile-long (11-kilometer), paved path fronting the Atlantic Ocean. Start at South Pointe Park and pedal north toward the town of Surfside. You'll pass by Lummus Park, where you'll see the iconic Art Deco-style ocean-facing hotels of South Beach that are featured in so many postcards and films. Pack a bathing suit and towel so you can stop for an ocean dip along the way.





Go on a kayaking tour in Everglades National Park

It's incredible that some of the wildest nature in the United States is within day-tripping distance of South Florida at Exergiscis, historial Example — a 1.5-million-acre (0.5-million-hectare) wetlands preserve spread across three of the state's counties. From the park's main Homestead Entrance, drive deeper into the wilderness to Flamingo Alarina, where you can rent single or double kayaks and two- or three-person cances from Flamingo Alarina and two- or three-person cances from Flamingo Alarina for relf-guided paddling trips. Venture along the Nine Mile Pond Cance Trail — a 5.2-mile (8.3-kilometer) loop that passes through shallow marshes and mangrove islands within the park — to spot aligators and crocodiles. For guided kayak tours of Everglades National Park, cross the state to the park's Everglades City Entrance, where operators like Shannichentures lead full-day trips into the Ten Thomand Island, National Wildrig Refuse.

Try snorkeling in Biscayne National Park

You don't need to venture far from downtown Miami to snorkel along the world's third largest coral barrier reef, part of which is located within <u>Historian Parts</u>, just east of Homestead. The National Park System's largest marine park is 95% water, with ample options for putting on a mask, fins and snorkel. More than 600 species of fish dwell here, often within eyeshot of downtown Miami's skyscrapers. On snorkeling excursions with the <u>Bittierne Historian Park Inscrume</u>, you might see parrotfish, sergeant majors, barracuda or even long-anouted seahorses in the seagrasses and along the reefs. Full- and half-day snorkeling trips into the national park depart from marinas in Homestead and Coconut Grove, with the latter being closer to Downtown Miami. Depending on the weather conditions in the bay and at the outer reef, you might even get to visit shallow shipwrecks.



Visit animal rescue centers to see rehabilitated wildlife

With so much diverse wildlife across Florida — everything from panthers and black bears to bobcats, manatees, pelicans, dolphins, deer and more — the state has its share of rescue centers you can visit to learn more about the animals and support their rehabilitation efforts.

During guided tours at Parther Ridge Communicion Contec in Loughatchee, just inland from West Palm Beach, you can get up close and personal with nine different species of big cats, including endangered Florida parthers. Native birds – raptors and wading birds among them – find temporary and permanent homes at Elough Flore Wide line Center, where a boardwalk winds through the lush mangroves. The center rescues, cares for and releases nearly 1,000 birds a year, and you can view them in various states of rehabilitation before they're released.

Explore Blowing Rocks Preserve

Named for the unique limestone shoreline, the largest on the Atlantic coast, <u>filowing Books Preserve</u> is a 73-acre (29-hectare) native coastal habitat restoration project — a chance to see Florida in its original wild state. The reserve is frome to sume of Florida's endangered species, both flora and fauna. Three species of sea turtles nest here, including loggerhead, green and leatherback. In the spring, Blowing Rocks runs a Sea Turtle Rescue Program to help the creatures find their way to the sea.

Summer months bring perfect conditions to snorkel and swim in calmer waters while winter months are best to catch the namesake "blowing rocks" in action. The sea water hits the craggy rocks on the beach, creating geysers of up to 50 feet (15 meters). Plan your visit at high tide and visit on a day with rough seas to spot the phenomenon.





Create your own beach clean-up during a day at the beach

A day at the beach can be spent sunbathing, splashing and surfing and giving back. Plan your own beach clean-up event to enjoy some time in the sun and sand, while also working to improve the local environment. It can be as simple as spending 30 minutes checking the shoreline around you for trash and plastics to pick up and dispose of responsibly.

Anne Marie Moquin, the founder of Jacksonville Beach-based nonprofit group <u>Braches Go Group</u>, suggests packing reusable materials to be as environmentally friendly as possible. As Moquin describes: "Bring reusable buckets, washable gloves and repurposed grain bags from a local brewery for trash bags or collection bags." She adds, "Try not to make more trash while cleaning up."

Where to Stay



McAlpin Ocean Plaza, a Hilton Grand Vacations Club

Just steps from the palm tree lined beach, McAlpin Ocean Plaza's 1- and 2-fledroom Subos are perfect for relaying after a day exploring the Everglades – and buasts an idyfic reoftop spa. The resort is located in the fluzzing Art Deco District and the property itself is a historically registered building that is as excellent example of the area's classic architecture.

Outdoors in Central Florida

Away from the coast, there is plenty more to see in the heart of the state. Just a short drive north of Orlando, you'll find Westing Springs State Park. Visitors flock to the naturally clear water to swim or paddleboard or simply enjoy a barbecue on the banks. To the east, Blue Spring State Park is another favorite swimming spot. But here, you may even get to share the waters with manatees, turties and even baby alligators, although visitors should be sure not to disturb these fascinating creatures.

For a relaxing nature walk, visit <u>Orlando Wetlands Park</u>, a green area dedicated to treating reclaimed water to make a safe home for the local wildlife. The area is popular with bird lovers as more than 240 species live in the lush wetlands. 

The best travel memories are often created when you're learning something new — or when you can see a historic site with a new perspective. Whether you walk along cobblestone streets in some of the oldest cities in the United States or explore royal residences in Scotland, your next vacation can allow you to wander through history.







Admire the iconic Leaning Tower of Pisa

Pisa, Italy

The city of Pisa has been an important metropolis since Roman times. Now, visitors flock here to catch a glimpse of the world-famous <u>caning</u> <u>Tower of Pisa</u>. Despite the tilt, which grew to 5.5 degrees in 1990, the tower has survived at least four major earthquakes since 1280.

Extensive work to stabilize the structure closed the site temporarily, but you can now climb the stairs inside the marble tower to hear the ringing of the ancient bells as you gaze out over the picturesque town square.

Four monuments — the tower, the cathedral, the baptistry and the cemetery — make up the Piazza del Duomo, a UNESCO World Heritage site. Inside the beautifully ornate cathedral, you'll find the Campo Santo cemetery. It's home to archaeological treasures and artwork from Roman and medieval times. Pisa is also the birthplace of scientist Galileo Galilei, and you can follow in his historic, scholarly footsteps at the University of Pisa, founded in 1343. Step back in time even further at San Paolo a Ripa d'Arno, one of Pisa's oldest churches. And for a traditional Italian espresso and pastry to fuel your wanders, visit Caffé dell'Ussero, which dates to the 1700s.

Ready to immerse yourself in even more Italian splendor? About a 90minute drive from Pisa is Florence, home to artistic marvels sure to inspire any history buff. Here, you'll find the sculpture "David" by Renaissance artist Michelangelo at the <u>Accudentia Gallery</u> and the Ponte Vecchio, a medieval shop-lined bridge that's perfect for admiring a gorgeous sunset.

Step back in time with colonial-era reenactments in Bridgetown

Bridgetown, Barbados

Dive beneath Barbados' beautiful Caribbean beaches, bustling cruise ports and delicious rum to discover its rich and fascinating history. Bridgetown, the country's capital, was founded in 1628, and the historic old town and colonial-era British garrison make up a UNESCO World Heritage site. Learn more at the Gun Hill Signal Station, which once protected the island from attack.

Barbados is one of the oldest continuing parliamentary democracies in the world. Visit the historic Parliament Buildings in Bridgetown and view the <u>National Heroes Gallery</u>, featuring sculptures crafted by local Barbadian and Caribbean artists. You can also walk around <u>George Washington House & Museum</u>, the reported vacation home of George Washington, the United States' first president.

The island was home to Arawak and Carib Indigenous peoples before colonization by the English in the 17th century, when Barbados became a leading producer of sugar in the Caribbean. You can learn about the country's origins and how it gained independence from Britain in 1966 at the Barbardos Museum Of Historical Society.

For a spectacular panoramic view of the tropical island's ocean scenery, tour <u>St. John's Parish Church</u>. The church was originally built in 1645 and was destroyed several times by fires and hurricanes before undergoing restoration in 1836.

And of course, no trip to Barbados would be complete without sampling some of the local specialty rum. The St. Nicholas Abbey rum distillery is located in one of the only remaining Jacobean-style mansions in the Western Hemisphere, dating back to the 1600s. You can visit the house and museum before having a tipple — and maybe grab a bottle of personalized blended rum to bring home. Finally, visit the Foursquare Rum Distillery and warehouse to learn how rum is made, stored and blended before being bottled.

Explore the royal residence of Balmoral Castle in Scotland

Cairngorms, Scotland

Whether your interest lies in stately homes, medieval castles or traditional whisky distilleries, you'll find it all in Scotland. The rugged hills of the Scottish Highlands' exquisite Cairngorms National Park make a stunning base for exploring the historic sites around the region (read more in our Summer 2022 time of Club Interior). In fact, it's estimated that there were once around 3,000 castles in Scotland.

Within the national park, you can visit the grounds and gardens of <u>Bahnoral Custie</u>, the British royal family's Scottish retreat. The impressive estate was a favorite of both Queen Victoria in the 1800s and of the United Kingdom's longest-reigning monarch, Queen Elizabeth II. This fall, floral tributes to the latter adorned the gates, where visitors left tokens to commemorate her 70 years on the throne.

Head south to Stirling Castle - once the childhood home of Mary Queen of Scots, who was crowned here in 1543. The medieval site is an immersive lesson about the tumultuous lives of the Stewart kings and queens. Actors dressed in period costumes play the parts of several castle roles including bodyguards, maids of honor and servants to give visitors a glimpse into 16th-century life.

Make your way to Inverness on the northeast coast to learn more about the Jacobite uprising — where Scottish lairds made a final stand against the ruling English military — and visit the site of the climactic 1746 Battle of Culloden. You'll find commemorative standing stones and grave markers at this National Trust for Scotland site.

To toast to your Scottish adventure, visit The Glenturret Distillery, which dates back to 1763. The brand's single malt whiskies include varieties highlighting the region's traditional earthy peat flavors, as well as bottles aged in American and European oak barrels that conjure notes of vanilla and caramel.



Wander the quaint downtown district of Charleston

Charleston, South Carolina

In Charleston, you'll find American history at every turn. The city is the site of the very first shot fired in the American Civil War, and the neo-classical architecture of the time is reflected throughout the charming streets. Get your bearings by taking a tour with Old South Carriage Company. Your guide will regale you with facts about the downtown district before visiting Fort Sumter in Charleston Harbor, a Civil War monument marking the start of the four-year conflict that forever shaped the history of the United States.

Historic landmarks dot this Southern gem — including the more than 200-year-old Dock Street Theatre and artisan Charleston City Market. To spend an afternoon enjoying the outdoors, visit the Charleston Ten Garden. Ride the trolley for a scenic tour passing

majestic magnolia trees and acres of tea bushes before stopping at the tea bar to sample the house brews — served hot or iced, depending on your preference.

Charleston is the oldest city in South Carolina, and to explore the origins of this storied city, visit Charles Towns Landing State Historic Site. Just off the Ashley River, this is where European settlers landed in 1670. Walk the self-guided tour to learn about what this land looked like and the animals that inhabited it, before it was colonized. Scheduled to open this year, the International African American Munaum will investigate the legacy of colonization and slavery through interactive digital exhibits and a thought-provoking memorial garden.

Sedona, Arizona

Among the red rock buttes and desert landscapes, experience. Sedona's ancient history. Spot the petroglyphs on rock walls that tell the stories of the Sinagua people (meaning "without water") who lived here centuries before Spanish settlers arrived. Learn more about their daily lives at the Tuzlgoot National Monument, which includes a 1,000-year-old ancient pueblo (village), featuring 110 rooms. Walking trails lead you around the pueblo with glorious views of the Tavasci Marsh and Verde River. Don't miss the displays at the park's visitor center, which houses authentic textiles, tools and ceramics.

Dramatically set into the surrounding cliffside, Montezuma Castle is one of the best-preserved ancient sites in Sedona. Although the name brings to mind a royal setting, this 20-room structure was home to multiple families and functioned more like a modern apartment building than a traditional castle. To take in more cliff homes, head north to the <u>Palatid Heritage Site</u>, the largest of its kind in Red Rock Country.

You can also find out more about Sedona's pioneers at the <u>Sedona</u> <u>Heritage Museum</u>. Visit the museum's replica telegraph office, originally a railroad depot but later turned into a filming set for classic western films in the 1940s and 1950s.

Finish your tour of the area onboard the <u>Verde Canyon Railroad</u>. The four-hour journey begins with a champagne toast and includes a soundtrack of classic railroad tunes to enjoy as you view the scenery from the vintage train car's panoramic windows.

Williamsburg, Virginia

This is especially true across the 301 acres of Colonial Williamsburg, where you can wander around dozens of original buildings, shops and museums like the Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Folk Art Museum, which features one of the world's largest folk art collections.

Next, visit the <u>Governor's Palace</u>, once home to Thomas Jefferson. There you'll encounter people dressed in traditional costumes representing real historical figures who lived centuries ago, known as "Nation Builders." For those looking to experience justice in the 18th century, head to the <u>Courthouse</u> and learn about the political debates that took place at <u>Rainigh Tavern</u>.

While in the area stop by the American Indian Encampment Site, where you'll find programs dedicated to the history of Indigenous Americans who lived here before Europeans arrived. The initiative teaches visitors about the contributions of representatives sent by Indian nations to Williamsburg, as well as the continuing legacy of colonialism in modern society.

To trace the origins of early English settlers, visit Historic Jamestowne where you will see the original Jamestown fort and marvel at archaeological finds. Continue onto the Jamestown Settlement to see the recreated Indigenous American town, followed by a stop at Tercentennial Monument for a historic walking tour of the colony's evolution.

Finally, picnic on the beach of First Landing State Park and explore the waterways once traversed by Native American Indian canoes and the spot where British colonists arrived in 1607. And for stories of seafarers from long ago, explore one of the largest maritime collections in the world at The Manners' Museum and Park.



At the Forum Shops at Caesars Palace, browse 160 specialty stores and restaurants, including luxury designers such as Louis Vuitton, Versace, Giorgio Armani, Valentino, Gucci and Christian Louboutin.





Dig into elevated comfort food at Carson Kitchen, a downtown Las Vegas mainstay. Look for creative spins on traditional eats like deviled eggs with crispy pancetta, beet tartare with mandarin oranges and goat cheese and pork belly with buffalo blue beurre blanc. Choose the perfect hike for you at Red Rock Canyon, a 30-minute drive from the Vegas Strip. See triassic fossils, desert plants and rugged cliffs on walks ranging from quick loops to day-long treks.



Explore the nation's capital, from the historic National Mall to rooftop cocktails, with our two-day itinerary



Day one 10 AM.

Launch your visit at the recently reoperied National Air and Space Museum, where you'll discover eight new and renovated galleries. exploring the country's avietion and space-exploration history. Exhibits include a replica of the International Space Station and artifacts like the Wright Brothers' 1909 biplane It's one of the many free Smithsonian fretitution museums located on and around the National Mall, a 2-mile (3.2-kilometer) swath of green space bookended by the United States Capitol to the east and the Lincoln Memorial to the west.

12 P.M.

Head next door to have lunch at Mitsitam Native Foods Cale. Located inside the National Museum of the American Indian, where menu items include Lakota fry bread, cedar-planked salmon, wild rice and watercress salad and other dishes inspired by Indigenous recipes. After your feast, explore the museum or one of the other galleries or monuments on the National Mail. Highlights include the National Gallery of Art (don't miss the Pop Art-filled Sculpture Gorden) and the Dwight D. Esenhower Memorial with its life-size statues of the 34th U.S. president.



Walk or catch the metro to the District's vibrant Wharf neighborhood for a stroll along the cobblestone streets surrounding the Potomac River to check out the waterfront views, the Municipal Fish Market (open since 1805) and stores such as Shop Made in DC, where you'll find locally-made jewelry, art and treats that make for terrific souvenirs



6.30 P.M.

Grab an early dinner at one of the Wharf's restaurants. Standouts include Rappuharmock Oyster Bar for delicious bivalves harvested from local waters and Officina - a three-level Italian-inspired concept with a cafe, trattoria and rooftop bar serving amaro-spiked cocktails and heavenly survet vistas.



8 P.M.

End the day with a concert or comedy show at The Anthem, a 57,000-square-foot (17,373-square-meter) performance venue known for its crop accustics and mis of standing room and seated spots. The lobby dazzles thanks to an art installation consisting of 150 cymbals suspended from the ceiling at various heights.



Day two OLM.

Fuel up at the Market Lunch, a long running diner inside Capitol Hill's Eastern Market, a circa-1873 red-brick market. and food half. If you're here on the weekend, you can sample the blueberry buckwheat pancakes or the crab cake eggs Benedict: Then, explore the charming neighborhood surrounding the U.S. Capitol on a Washington Walks tour, which takes in sites from a 17th-century estate to a cherry tree-filled park devoted to Abraham Lincoln.



11.30 A.M.

Book a free tour of the United States Capitol, where red blazer recening guides point out highlights like the 287-foot-high dome with its mural of George Washington ascending to the heavens. In the National Statuary Hall, look for statues of notable Americans, some of such 100 statues - two for each of the 50 states - that you can spot across the building. Don't miss the recently tristalled likenesses of aviator Amelia Earhart and civil rights pioneer Many McLeod Bethune. Then head around the corner to peck into the Supreme Court Building or the Library of Congress (both are open to visitors):

2 P.M.

Grab a cab or use a ride-halling service to get yourself to Union Market, where a cornucopial of shops and rescurants make their homes in restored warehouses just morth of the Capitol Try the tases at Taqueria Lus Gernelus or the salmon barger at The District Fishwife, their grab some descent or a drink to enjoy at the routop pionic area. After lunch, browse the shops in and around the market, including local bookstere Politics and Prose and hip bootique Sale & Sundry.




6 P.M.


